Welcome to the Draft SEATP Review



What is the Southeast Alaska Transportation Plan (SEATP)?

- The updated Southeast Alaska Transportation Plan will guide transportation investments across Southeast Alaska for the next 20 years.
- The plan evaluates regional transportation needs, including travel between communities and local transportation needs with broader regional importance.
- The plan considers all transportation modes, including roads, ferries, airports, trails, transit, freight, and active transportation.
- Community priorities, needs, and potential projects help shape the plan's recommendations.
- The SEATP helps inform future transportation funding decisions, including the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) and Airport Improvement Program (AIP).



Why It Matters: The Draft SEATP provides a long-range vision to support a safe, reliable, resilient, and interconnected transportation system that strengthens Southeast Alaska's communities, economy, and quality of life.

Draft SEATP Vision & Goals



Vision Statement

An integrated land, air, and marine transportation system providing safe access to essential services, economic opportunities, and social connections for all users that is more cost-effective, resilient, and well-maintained.

1

Safety and Accessibility:

Provide safe access to transportation options for all users.

2

System Reliability:

Improve the reliability of air, marine, and land transportation systems to support more consistent and dependable service.

3

Cost-Effective Intermodal System:

Strengthen connections between land, air, and marine modes to create a more integrated and efficient transportation network.

4

Economic Vitality:

Enhance transportation infrastructure and services that facilitate thriving communities, workforce access, and commerce.

5

Resilience and Preservation:

Advance efforts to support more routine preservation, resilient infrastructure, and rapid response to hazard events to maintain the system in a state of good repair.

Recommendations: Strategies, Plans & Studies



The Draft SEATP identifies strategies and actions to improve transportation reliability, resilience, connectivity, and long-term system performance throughout Southeast Alaska.

Partnerships

- Strengthen coordination with communities, Tribal governments, and regional partners
- Leverage the new Southeast Regional Planning Organization (SE-RPO)
- Pursue funding opportunities through partnerships

Operations

- Improve emergency response preparedness
- Focus maintenance resources on critical assets
- Improve winter maintenance coordination

Planning & Studies

- Airport planning and resiliency studies
- Active transportation network gap studies
- Regional transportation connection and mobility studies
- Infrastructure risk assessment and mitigation planning

These recommendations support the Draft SEATP Vision and Goals and help guide future transportation investments and decision-making.

The Draft SEATP identifies regionwide investment priorities that support safety, reliability, preservation, connectivity, and resilience across all transportation modes.

These investment priorities focus on maintaining existing transportation assets, improving resilience, enhancing connectivity, and supporting Southeast Alaska's communities and economy.

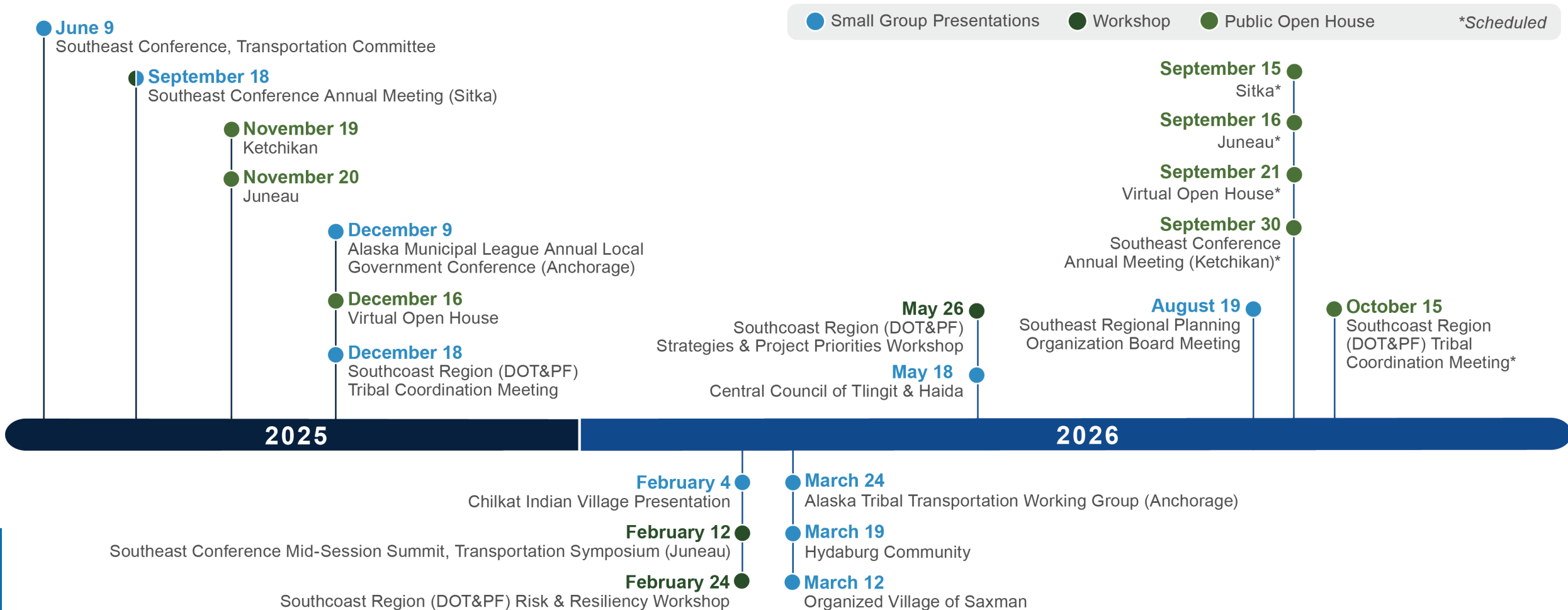
Recommendations: Capital Project Priorities



The Draft SEATP identifies specific capital priorities across transportation modes and communities throughout Southeast Alaska.

 Bridges	Juneau, City and Borough	Juneau-Douglas North Crossing
 Bridges	Ketchikan Gateway Borough	Complete the South Tongass Highway and Water Street Viaduct Project that includes repairs to Tongass Ave (#0997) and Water Street (#0797) Viaducts.
